Description of their journey to Van Deimen's Land (as Tasmania was then known) This description comes from Martin family records.

James Martin, his wife Mary Witt and four children, (James b. 1831, John b. 1833, Mary Elizabeth b. 1834 and Henry b. 1835), left Portsmouth on the Barque "Isabella", on 9th January, 1838. (Archives Office of Tasmania - CSO92/3)or (CSD 67 fo.51). They arrived in Hobart, Tasmania on 4th May, 1838, a fine day. (N.B. The "Isabella" began her journey from Gravesend, Kent and sailed first for Portsmouth. It's possible that the family boarded the "Isabella" at Gravesend, near London, sailed to Portsmouth with the ship before finally setting sail for Australia.

A daughter, Julia Harriett, was born during the journey, on the 24th March, 1838. She was christened in the Parish of Trinity Church in Hobart on 1st July, 1838. (Tasmanian Civil Reg. No. 518/8507 - 1838).

"The "Isabella" under Captain V. Sampson, sailed from London on the 16th December, 1837, bound firstly for Portsmouth. The owners were Nelson. She departed Portsmouth on the 9th January, 1838 with General Cargo and Government Stores. Sailing for Port Philip were fifteen crew and thirty-eight passengers and families; nineteen adults and seventeen children travelled steerage. Five passengers were Cabin passengers and they included Lieut. Munday and Captain Pollock.

The "Isabella", a barque, registered in London, 323 tons, Whitby built with two guns.
